This narrative supports the Annual Post Americanism Report and is attached thereto as follows:

1. COMMUNITY SERVICE AND SAFETY.

a. <u>Public Safety and Service Awards</u>. Custer Post #46 public safety and service awards were presented at the annual American Legion Birthday Supper observed the evening of 17 March 2019 at Crazy Horse Memorial's Laughing Water Restaurant. 99 people attended. The Master of Ceremonies was Duane Martinz, with awards presented by Commander Hone.

- b. <u>Custer Area Veterans Memorial Association</u>. Custer Post #46 is a founding member of the association, which was created in early 2012. The mission of the association is to create a memorial park with suitable monuments to honor all Custer area veterans. The park was dedicated on 11 November 2018. The Post already maintains its re-dedicated Veterans' Memorial Flagpole in Way Park. Photo attached.
- c. <u>Cold Springs Historical Society</u>. Custer Post #46 has a history of supporting the Cold Springs Historical Society. This support was renewed in 2011 with the Post's Life Membership in the Society. In 2018 the Post participated in Memorial Day and Wreaths Across America ceremonies at the Cold Springs Pioneer Cemetery. The Post donates both bronze war markers and flags for the society's Cold Springs Pioneer Cemetery veterans' graves.
- d. <u>Blood Donor Program</u>. Commencing 17 August 2016 joined with Custer City Lodge #66 A.F. & A.M. to sponsor UBS blood drives. In the current reporting period the Post coordinated and conducted 6 drives totaling 347 donors, exceeding all goals. Due to this success, both the amount of drives in Custer and their goals have been increased for 2019. Photo attached.



e. <u>Honor Guard</u>. The Custer Veterans Honor Guard provided services for 10 funerals and 10 patriotic events. Photo attached.

2. <u>EDUCATION ACTIVITIES</u>.

- a. On 21 November 2018 supported the Elk Mountain School's Veterans Day Program by donating American and South Dakota flags for the students' flag retirement/raising ceremony.
- b. On 14 December 2018 provided breakfast to 65 students, faculty, and staff at Custer Jr/Sr High School as part of the monthly Friday Morning ICU Program.
- c. On 20 March 2019 named Jody Rounseville of Custer Elementary School as Educator of the Year.
- 3. <u>YOUTH ACTIVITIES</u>. The Post continues to maintain and expand its youth activities. This has become so reliably important that this year, 13 February was again designated as "Legion Day" at Custer High School. This permitted introduction of multiple programs to the students.
- a. <u>American Legion Boys State</u>. Because Custer County's only high school co-located with a Post is located in Custer City, Custer Post #46 administratively oversees the selection process of all the county's delegates to the American Legion SD Boys State with participation of Hermosa Post #303 (when desired). The 2019 program included Custer County, Custer High School, Custer School District (Home Schools), and Elk Mountain School District (with Home Schools). The process consisted of (timeline attached):
- (1) On 13 February 2019 introduced four interested boys from the Junior Classes to the Boys State program. This was a joint Boys & Girls States pizza lunch briefing at Custer High School.
 - (2) Currently awaiting two online applications and statements of interest.
 - (3) Interviews are scheduled for candidates on 20 March 2019.
 - b. Boy Scouts of America. Custer Post #46 supported "Scouting" this reporting period by;
- (1) Including Boy Scout Troop 25 and Cub Scout Pack 25 in the 2018 Memorial Day veterans' graves decoration; and,
- (2) Supplying roses for Cub Scout Pack 25 distribution to veterans on Veterans Day, 2017.



- c. <u>Youth Trooper Academy</u>. This SD American Legion/Highway Patrol program launched in 2012 is supervised by the Post's Vice Commander Glen Talley, a retired Law Enforcement Officer. The Post works closely with South Dakota Highway Patrol. This year's activities:
 - (1) On 13 February 2019 briefed the Custer High School Junior Class about the program. Awaiting applications.
- d. <u>Auxiliary Girls State</u>. Custer Post #46 has integrated the Girls State program with its youth programs. The Post assists the Hermosa Unit #303 of the SD American Legion Auxiliary with the program that it manages for Custer County. Activities consisted of:
 - (1) On 13 February 2019 introduced five interested girls from the Junior Classes to the Girls State program. This was a joint Boys & Girls States pizza lunch briefing at Custer High School.
 - (2) One girl has already applied for Journalism City.
- f. <u>High School Rodeo Americanism Award</u>. This new program was introduced to the Custer High School Rodeo Team in 2018. On 13 February 2019 nine team members were present at the briefing. All the rodeo team is interested in competing in this exciting new program!



- 4. <u>PATRIOTIC HOLIDAY PROGRAMS</u>. Custer Post #46 conducts and sponsors numerous patriotic holiday programs. They are described as follows:

- b. <u>Independence Day.</u>
- (1) Custer Post #46 participated in Custer City's 2018 "Old Time Country Fourth" as follows:
 - (a) Participated in the parade:
 Convertible with Vietnam Veteran Legionnaires Glen and Donna Talley.
 Parade entry consisting of 10 veteran combat service support vehicles appropriately decorated with flags, bunting, and American Legion magnetic decals.

VA's Mobile Veterans Center arranged by and part of Post's entry.

- (b) Created Custer's first military vehicle show.
- (c) Participated in the Veterans Memorial Park Flag Ceremony.
- (d) Created and co-sponsored the Patriots Picnic at the Senior Center.
- (e) Coordinated Veterans Outreach at the Patriots Picnic by the VA Center's Tahoe.
- (2) Post #46 conducted its American flag fundraiser on Independence Day at various locations in Custer. This high-visibility activity is the Post's oldest recurring fundraiser and is well-supported by the community and visitors.



- c. <u>Memorial Day</u>. Custer Post #46 works closely with the Custer City Cemetery Sexton to maintain a veterans' graves registry. The Post also marks all veterans' graves for Memorial Day with bronze flag holders and American Flags which it purchases. Approximately 500 Custer veterans' graves were decorated on 25 May with flag removal on 29 May. Assisting were Custer Boy Scout Troop 25, Custer Cub Scout Pack 25, Custer Girl Scouts, SD DAR Harney Peak Chapter, and local volunteers. Newspaper photographs attached.
- d. <u>Legion Lake Lodge Annual Opening</u>. Each year Custer Post #46 renews its ties to its namesake, Legion Lake Lodge. On the lodge's 12 May 2018 annual opening, members raised the American and Legion flags in front of the lodge. The flags remained flying until the day's closing when they were lowered by the Post's Color Guard. An American flag and South Dakota state flag were then donated to Legion Lake Lodge to fly for the rest of the season.
- e. <u>Veterans Day</u>. This Post #46 sponsored event is conducted by all schools in Custer. Planned by the Custer High School senior class with guidance from Post #46, this 1-hour program honoring veterans is conducted in the old Custer Armory. All classes participate with every veteran individually recognized and presented a rose and thank you note for their service. The guest speaker was South Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs Larry Zimmerman. Attendance was standing room only at 500+ with extensive press and television coverage. Newspaper articles and photographs attached.
- f. <u>Pearl Harbor Day.</u> Six WWII veterans were honored during the National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day program on Friday, December 7th, 2018 at the Custer Senior Center. The program, sponsored by the 1881 Courthouse Museum, Custer American Legion Post 46, Custer Senior Center and Custer VFW Post 3442, honored the county's WWII veterans through displays, speeches, stories, gifts, and dinner. While only five veterans could attend, Custer County's 10 known living WWII veterans were all honored. Newspaper article and photographs attached.
- g. <u>Legion Birthday</u>. Though not a holiday, the American Legion Birthday is observed annually by Custer Post #46. Always well received, this year's birthday supper at Crazy Horse Memorial was attended by 99 on 17 March 2019 with Public Safety/Service awards, membership awards, and special awards presentations following as part of the program. - 5. <u>FLAG EDUCATION</u>. Custer Post #46 participated in four flag education events during this reporting period:
- a. <u>Etiquette</u>. Conducted the "For Which It Stands" flag education program with the entire Junior Class of Custer High School on Loyalty Day, 01 May 2018.
 - b. <u>Parade the Colors</u>. Color Guard led the Patriots Parade in Custer's Independence Day "Old Time Country Fourth".
- c. <u>Retire/Raise the Colors</u>. Custer City's official Independence Day flag event, this ceremony retires Custer City's massive United States Flag and raises a new one to fly continuously until retirement on the eve of the next Independence Day.
 - d. <u>Color Ceremony</u>. Supervised Elk Mountain School students conducting the flag ceremony as part of their 21 November 2018 Veterans Day Program.
- 6. <u>SERVICE TO GOD AND COUNTRY</u>. Custer Post #46 conducts and participates in several Service to God and Country programs. They are described as follows:
- a. <u>Taps</u>. The Post is dedicated to honoring the memory of all area departed veterans. This is accomplished through several interlocking Post programs and participation in related separate projects as described below:
- (1) <u>Graves Registration</u>. The Post Service Officer, as Graves Registration Officer, works closely with the Custer City Sexton, the Pringle Cemetery Sexton, and the Cold Springs Historical Society to ensure veterans gravesites in the Custer and Pringle city cemeteries and Pioneer Cemetery are properly identified and recorded. This, in turn, supports other Post programs to honor departed veterans such as the Memorial Day veterans' graves decoration.
- (2) <u>Final Roll Call</u>. The Post is particularly concerned that it honors its departed Legionnaires. The Post has expended great effort to obtain digital obituaries of its departed Legionnaires back to 2005. Sympathy cards are sent when timely & appropriate. Funerals are attended when possible. Online guest books are signed with appropriate sentiments by the Commander. The Post Charter is draped in mourning for the month following death. And the departed Legionnaires' names are read at the annual Veterans Day program. Finally the Legionnaires' obituaries are included on the Post's website, www.custerlegion46.org, as a lasting tribute.




- (3) <u>Last Salute</u>. The Post also honors its recently departed area veterans who were not Legionnaires. Online guest books are signed with appropriate sentiments by the Public Affairs Officer and Graves Registration Officer. The departed veterans' names are read at the annual Veterans Day program. Links to their memorial webpages are maintained on the Post's website until read at the Veterans Day program. And their digital obituaries are both shared with the County Veteran Service Officer and retained for historical purposes.
- b. <u>Missing In America Project</u>. This organization is dedicated to ensuring that no veteran's cremated remains are abandoned and forgotten. It locates such "cremains" and ensures that they receive proper burial with appropriate military honors. Custer Post #46 supports this project through its 1st Vice Commander, Glen Talley, who is the "West River" coordinator of the project.
- c. <u>Wreaths Across America</u>. Custer Post #46 participates in this annual event at the Cold Springs Pioneer Cemetery by Pringle, SD and the Custer City Cemetery in Custer, SD. Both events were conducted on 15 December 2018 just ahead of a winter storm which limited attendance.
- d. <u>Grave Marker Program</u>. Commencing 23 August 2016, the Post participates in a joint veterans program setting and replacing veterans' grave markers. To date, two VA grave markers have been set with others identified for re-setting or replacement.
- 7. <u>COUNTER SUBVERSIVE ACTIVITIES</u>. Custer Post #46 had no counter subversive activities events during this reporting period.
- 8. <u>IMMIGRATION AND NATURALIZATION ACTIVITIES</u>. Custer Post #46 had no immigration and naturalization activities events during this reporting period.

Veterans Memorial dedication is culmination of six-year journey

than six years ago will finally come to fruition this Sunday at 8 a.m. when the Custer Area Veterans Memorial Park is dedicated. Several members of the memorial association, the group responsible for planning and constructing the memorial park on the south end of 5th Street in Custer, met Monday morning at the Senior Citizens Center to discuss final plans. Jim Hattervig talked about the original vision for the memorial which came from a conversation he had with former Custer Mayor Gary Lipp when they were serving on the city council in 2012. "He just mentioned we ought to have a veterans memorial. And I was commander of the VFW then and I got to thinking about that a little bit. And as I thought it through, the VFW couldn't handle that alone so I called up Mark [Mills] and Dave Fluck [of the American Legion] and we met at the Wrangler a couple times." From those informal meetings in early 2012, it was decided to form a nonprofit corporation called the Custer Area Veterans Memorial Association. The founding meeting was held July 18, 2012. Hattervig had decided that as commander of the VFW and a city council member, he shouldn't head

up the association, so he

A community-wide

process that began more

tapped Tony Gonsor, who had prior experience in building such memorials, to be the association president Gonsor said at first the committee was made up of three members from the VFW and three from the Legion, but soon decided to include members who were not veterans to get a broader range of vision and support. Bringing on board nonveterans like Custer Senior Center director Jill Kettle, high school student Ember Fluck and Dave Hazeltine turned out to be a great idea. Gonsor said Kettle wrote grants for the association and Hazeltine was instrumental in helping the group get a \$5,000 grant. As chairman, Gonsor takes little credit for the success of the project, saying, "I've worked with a lot of committees and this is the best committee I've ever worked with. We don't always see eye to eye, but we iron it out." The city of Custer provided the property for the memorial and it will remain a city park. Gonsor said when the project is completed, the association will turn over any leftover funds to the city for ongoing maintenance. A groundbreaking ceremony was held Sept. 19, 2012, and the Custer Area Chamber of Commerce said it was one of the largest ground-breakings they had been a part of. The group is happy about the location which catches the eye as visitors

come down the hill into

Custer on Highway 385. "It's a perfect location for us," said Gonsor, who said the park will be the focal point for Memorial Day, Independence Day and Veterans Day observances for years to come. He said its central location away from heavy traffic noise will make it a better venue than the Custer Cemetery for such ceremonies. Names of veterans will be printed on bricks which will be mounted on large slanting steel stands. Organizers say the bricks won't be in any particular order except for the grouping of family members and other requested groupings. Furthermore, the memorial is not limited to veterans from the Custer area. Association director Mark Mills said it's the Custer area's memorial to all veterans. Association director Ken Irwin said bricks may be purchased for anyone who has worn a U.S. military uniform and has received an honorable discharge. "A few years ago the state changed the definition of veteran," Irwin said. "The new definition includes National Guard people who have never been deployed." Gonsor said a number of out-of-state visitors have purchased bricks for friends and relatives from all over. Someone bought a brick in honor of WWII hero Audie Murphy, and George Armstrong Custer will also have a brick. "I had one little girl in

the first booth we set up in Way Park," said Gonsor, "She bought a brick for her dad. And I said, 'Does your dad have any connection to Custer?' She said, 'No. But now he has to come and see his brick."

About 600 bricks have been purchased so far, but

About 600 bricks have been purchased so far, but there is room for 1,900 bricks, said Gonsor. "We'll always have veterans, and if we don't, we're in trouble," he said.

The steel platforms that


will hold the bricks were recently installed, along with two additional flagpoles on either side of the large American flagpole. They will display the South Dakota state flag and the POW/MIA flag. Gonsor said the group will wait until spring to install the bricks and epoxy them together, but the lights are expected to be installed before the ceremony on Sunday.

Association members

expressed their appreciation for the many hours of volunteer work and materials donated by the people of Custer. A group of former Marines from Sioux Falls called Rolling Thunder donated a marble bench and local Girl Scouts built and planted two planter boxes for the park. Sunday's dedication program will begin at 8 a.m. and will be followed by a reception at the VFW post home.







The children's fair will also have a 20-foot Native American tipi on July 3 and Kent will explain to children what it was like to live in a tipi and how people lived off the land.

The Patriots' Parade marshall will be Marty Mahrt of Custer to honor his service as a pilot in the Vietnam War. Special guests honored in the parade include new VFW Post 3442 commander Peggy White, World War II veterans Harold Stickney, Floyd Mills and Roy Roadifer, Col. John Edwards, the commander of the 28th Bomb Wing at Ellsworth Air Force Base, the American Legion state vice commander and District 2 commander and new U.S. citizen Sara Bishop. The Patriots' Picnic, hosted by Custer VFW,

American Legion and Senior Center, will begin at 10:30 a.m. at the senior center. It will run until 1 p.m. Following the parade, the Rapid City Veterans Center will be located next to the senior center to assist veterans with obtaining VA benefits.






Memorial Day activities set





'Go out and find the stories'

Zimmerman charges audience to find veteran stories

By Ron Burtz Speaking without notes and frequently interacting with veterans seated in the audience, South Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs Secretary Larry Zimmerman gave an energetic and emotional keynote address at the 24th Annual Veterans Day program at the Custer Armory on Monday. The culmination of five days of veteran-related events in the area, the Armory was filled nearly to capacity as Custer elementary and high school students, veterans and other community members turned out at 2 p.m. to honor those who have served in America's armed forces. Following a program which included poems and other readings, a POW/MIA empty chair ceremony. songs by the grade school and high school

choirs, Zimmerman was introduced by senior Dakota Prior. Taking a wireless microphone and abandoning the platform, Zimmerman spoke extemporaneously, frequently inviting veterans to stand to give their name and tell when and where they served. In the process he introduced the only three World War II veterans in attendance. "There are 70,000 veterans in South Dakota and all of them have a story," said Zimmerman. He displayed his late father's WWII uniform and told of his regret of never having been told the story of his father's four years of service. Noting that this Veterans Day marked the 100th anniversary of the Armistice which ended World War I, Zimmerman lamented the fact that none of those veterans are still living to tell their stories. "They're all gone," he

said. "And our World War II veterans are leaving us too fast. I want the students to go out and find the stories. Go out and find them while you still have time." "We fought for the freedoms of this great country so we could sit here today and do our Pledge of Allegiance to the flag, sing the National Anthem, be able to go to our churches because men and women went and fought for our freedoms," said Zimmerman. Specifically addressing the many students in the crowd, Zimmerman concluded his comments by saying, "an old veteran is going to give an assignment." "Go home," he said. "Go to the city. Go somewhere and find a story, because they're inside each one of these veterans sitting in front of you. God bless America and happy Veterans Day."


