# **Custer, Custer County Recognize Centennial Year of the American Legion**

The Centennial of the American Legion is a great reason to celebrate, and the posts of Custer County have started the party in an impressive manner.

In November, Custer Post #46 held a community movie night at the Custer Jr/Sr High School, in which 50 people braved cold weather to enjoy "Sgt Stubby: An American Hero," an animated film based on the famous WWI Army mascot. Two dog teams from Custer County Search & Rescue, along with the bomb detection dog team from the South Dakota Highway Patrol, joined in the celebration by giving demonstrations for the crowd. Additionally, participants were treated to a display of Custer County WWI artifacts, loaned out by the 1881 Courthouse Museum and Custer Post #46

To kick off 2019, the City of Custer made formal recognition of the American Legion's 100th year

by presenting Custer Post #46 with a proclamation declaring 2019 as the Custer Post #46, American Legion, Centennial Year. In the January 7th proclamation, Mayor Corbin Herman (who happens to be a Post #46 member himself) highlights the many activities the Legion is so well known for, to include Honor Guard, Americanism programs, community service and much more. The post will officially turn 100 on July 28th, 2019.

On January 9th, the Custer County Commission acknowledged the work of both Custer County American Legion Posts-Custer and Hermosa-for their work within the county.

With more Centennial plans in the works, the Custer County posts are making the 100th year memorable. By including their communities, they're also doing their part to get the American Legion message out.

I hope everyone one had a Merry Christmas and a beginning of a Happy New Year. As of writing this article, National has our membership at 16,325. Our target of 20,001 is getting nearer every day. Now is when we need to visit our Guard Units, gun shows, farm & home shows or whatever event comes up in your community. Always remember if you need assistance at any events contact the State Adjutant or myself and we'll make sure you have additional people. We are all working together for the same goal.

I've been at recruiting events and noticed the response from veterans when asked to join the American Legion. Over 50% of the new members signed up will respond "I didn't know I was eligible" or "Nobody has ever asked me". I have asked all Department leaders to sign up 3 new members this year. Many have signed up 3 members and some have kept on going. We have leaders that have signed up 60, 36, 22, 10 and many with over 3.

I asked all Posts to come in one member over goal. Many have achieved this and my hope is that all Posts come in at 100%. I urge all Posts to contact all members on their roster and renew them back in The American Legion. If you have went through your roster and are still short, contact the State Adjutant and he will give you a list of members in your area that haven't renewed in the last two years. Many of these veterans will renew if they are contacted. Please have your Post in at 100% by Midwinter if possible.

March 15-17, 1919, is when The American Legion was founded by Theodore Roosevelt Jr. and twenty of his officers. This year is going to have many celebrations celebrating our first 100 years. I would ask all Posts to have someone present at our State Convention in Sioux Falls this year. We have presentations to make to all Posts. Please put it on your agenda. If you are scheduling an event at your Post and would like me to be there, please send me the date and I'll make every effort to come and help your Post celebrate.

I truly enjoy learning about the History of The American Legion. Last year our National Convention was in Minneapolis. With Minneapolis hosting the first convention it was only fitting they host the 100<sup>th</sup>. At the Convention we were given a book that reviewed events that took place at the first convention. They talked of the enthusiasm that was shown by the delegates, guests and interested parties. The Minneapolis Tribune on November 9, 1919, wrote "They will gather in Minneapolis tomorrow to launch the greatest organization of veterans in world history". Another article wrote "We are passing through dark and turbulent time just now and it is a wonderful comfort and reassurance to find this representative body of young men thinking clearly and speaking bravely and forcefully to support the essen-

tial principle of our government. The American Legion is the hope of the country

The American Legion is still the hope of the country. Be proud to be a Legionnaire. For over 100 years we have been taking care of our communities, children and our nation. Let's bring all veterans into our family. Thank you.

I seldom get those calls of "Our Post is doing awesome things and we want to share what we are doing!". With that said, this month's column is focused more on those calls I do get

A century ago our organization was established under Pillars that focused on our Veterans, our Children, our Americanism/Patriotism and the defense of our Nation. These pillars have never changed and stand firmly in place since the inception of this great organization. How we execute these pillars might have changed; they have likely evolved as generations of veterans have come and gone but the true spirit and purpose remains.

During my time in the service, I learned several key ingredients to any organization, that when overlooked, would lead to diminished returns. The 2019 Legislative Session in Pierre kicked off on Tuesday, January 8, 2019, with the Governor's State of the State Address and the House and Senate in session. This session has a 38 day calendar; below are the current bills The American Legion is monitoring. We anticipate a few more bills concerning veterans will be introduced as the session progresses and we will monitor them as well. February 2nd is the last day to introduce individuals bills. The following are the current bills we are monitoring and their status as of January 27, 2019:

HB 1007 revise certain provisions regarding the exemptions from the twelve-month residency requirement for university students. House of Representatives (HoR) Do Pass 1/25

HB 1043 require the Department of Social Services to collect and report certain information regarding the military affiliation of a parent whose child is subject to a report of abuse or neglect. HoR Do Pass 1/25

HB 1044 authorize certain children who are subject to a pending military relocation to apply for enrollment in a school district. Military & Vet Affairs, Do Pass Amended 1/23

HB 1051 establish the South Dakota state seal of civics literacy program. Education, Do Pass Amended 1/25

HB 1056 prohibit certain local ordinances regarding firearms. Local Government, Amend 1/24

SB 8 provide for a statewide resource information system. State Affairs, Amend 1/23

SB 9 provide for the Servicemember Firearms Protection Act. Referred to Senate Military & Vet Affairs, 1/15

SB 55 require the national motto of the United States to be displayed in public schools. Referred Sen Education, 1/17 SB 58 authorize the Bureau of Administration to conduct a study of the Flaming Fountain on Capitol Lake, to make

an appropriation therefor, and to declare an emergency. Referred to Joint Committee on Appropriations, 1/22 SCR 3Commending, honoring, and thanking South Dakota's numerous women veterans for their service to our country and state. Senate Adopt, 1/10, HoR Concur, 1/14.

# Temporary Financial Assistance Applications Surge in Wake of Government Shutdown

#### The American Legion Steps Up to the Plate to Help Coast Guard Families Affected

INDIANAPOLIS (WISH) - The partial government shutdown is driving thousands of U.S. Coast Guard members to apply for financial assistance with the American Legion.

A team of American Legion staff members volunteered to work on Martin Luther King Jr. Day to sort through a record number of Temporary Financial Assistance applications, known in government-speak as TFAs.

"We get 'thank yous' every day," TFA Program Director Meagan Sweet said. They say "it helps put gas in the car, because they're still having to go to work and their kids don't have groceries right now. So, it helps them a lot." Nearly 42,000 Coast Guard personnel missed a paycheck earlier this month,

and, if the shutdown continues into February, it could happen again. The American Legion's TFA program runs on donations, and, for now, the Legion can only afford to pay the Coast Guard members who need it the most. They are focusing on helping the junior enlisted ranks with children at home.

Retired Coast Guard Vice Admiral Terry Cross said the typical Third Class Petty Officer earns a base pay of about \$600 per week.

"When they miss a paycheck, it's a big deal," Cross said. "If they miss two paychecks, it could be a disaster for a family in terms of rent payment, mort-gage payments, just putting food on the table."

Cross is hoping Congress will pass House Resolution 367, which would pay the Coast Guard during the shutdown. It is the only armed forces branch not getting paid.

Sweet said, during the shutdown, the Legion has given out more than \$700,000 in payments to Coast Guard members. A TFA applicant can receive up to \$1,500.

Now, the TFA program is running low on funds. Donations can be made at legion.org/donate.

"We've been there. We had kids while we were in (the military). So, it's vets giving back to vets," Sweet said. "It feels good but it is emotional. It's over-whelming."

**Temporary Financial Assistance runs on donations** both at the state and national level. Applications have been on the rise—since July 2018, the Department TFA fund has handled 3 claims, and processed 2 national claims. In all of 2018, almost \$7,000 has been dispersed.

On Feb. 3, 1943, four Army chaplains - Father John P. Washington, Rabbi Alexander D. Goode, and the Revs. George L. Fox and Clark V. Poling – gave up their life jackets on a sinking Army transport in the North Atlantic so that others might live.

Of the 902 soldiers, Navy armed guard, ship's crew and civilian passengers on board the Dorchester, only 230 survived. They have told us of the chaplains' efforts to restore calm in a hopeless and chaotic situation, and how they were last seen at the ship's stern, arms linked in pray-

Yet, we single out and hold it before us as a reminder that all persons – of all faiths and colors and creeds - are capable of showing such courage and such compassion. Today's world runs on apps. There's literally an app for everything: want to lose weight? There's an app for that. Want to play cards? Yep, another app. Want to stare into the sky and see where the constellations lie? The app is out there. Navigating apps-which ones to download, in particular-is a daunting task. There are nearly 2.1 million available on the Android market, and not all of them are worth their salt. Allow me to make a few recommendations on applications specific to veterans:

The American Legion App: The American Legion is the nation's largest organization of U.S. military veterans. This app offers a succinct description of the Legion's forms of advocacy, opportunities to join, donate and find nearby posts. Search for The American Legion on either the Apple Store or Google Play.

VA PTSD Coach: PTSD Coach was designed for those who have, or may have, posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD). This app provides you with education about PTSD, information about professional care, a self-assessment for PTSD, opportunities to find support, and tools that can help you manage the stresses of daily life with PTSD. Tools range from relaxation skills and positive self-talk to anger management and other common self-help strategies. You can customize tools based on your preferences and can integrate your own contacts, photos, and music. This app can be used by people who are in treatment as well as those who are not. Search for the PTSD Coach on either the Apple Store or Google Play.

VA Video Connect: Apple users, pay attention! This application is for you. VA Video Connect connects Veterans with their health care team from anywhere, using encryption to ensure a secure and private session. It makes VA health care more convenient and reduces travel times for Veterans, especially those in very rural areas with limited access to VA health care facilities, and it allows quick and easy health care access from any mobile or web-based device. Veterans and their health care providers jointly decide whether to use VA Video Connect for a medical visit. Please speak with your VA care team if you are interested in potentially receiving care through VA Video Connect. Ahead of a VA Video Connect appointment, you will receive an email or calendar invite with a link to launch the session. Search the Apple Store for VA Video Connect-Android users, the link sent to your email will work without downloading an app.

Mindfulness Coach 2: Mindfulness means noticing and paying attention to what is going on in the present moment, without passing judgment on it. Mindfulness has been shown to be effective for reducing stress, improving emotional balance, increasing self-awareness, helping with anxiety and depression, and coping more effectively with chronic pain. Mindfulness Coach 2 was developed to help Veterans, Service members, and others learn how to practice mindfulness. The app provides a gradual, self-guided training program designed to help you understand and adopt a simple mindfulness practice. Mindfulness Coach also offers a library of information about mindfulness, 12 audioguided mindfulness exercises, a growing catalog of additional exercises available for free download, goal-setting and tracking, a mindfulness mastery assessment to help you track your progress over time, customizable reminders, and access to other support and crisis resources. Search the Apple Store or Google Play for Mindfulness Coach 2

Parenting2Go: A shoutout to my minions here—I love my children, but they are undoubtedly a source of stress in my life. Enter Parenting2Go: Parenting2Go helps Veterans and Service members reconnect with their children and provides convenient tools to strengthen parenting skills. It can be used alone or in combination with the online Parenting for Service Members & Veterans course. Parents can find quick parenting advice; relaxation tools to use when frustrated or stressed; tools to improve their relationship with their children through positive communication; and strategies to switch gears between military life and home. The app addresses challenges that come with parenting children of all ages and backgrounds. The app also offers guidance for seeking professional help and access to additional resources. Search the Apple Store and Google Play for Parenting2Go.

StayQuit Coach: Stay Quit Coach is designed to help with quitting smoking. It is intended to serve as a source of readily available support and information for adults who are already in treatment to quit smoking, to help them stay quit even after treatment ends. The app guides you in creating a tailored plan that takes into account your personal reasons for quitting. It provides information about smoking and quitting, interactive tools to help users cope with urges to smoke, and motivational messages and support contacts to help you stay smoke-free. Search the Apple Store and Google Play for StayQuit Coach.

## PAGE 7 USS South Dakota Set to Enter **Active Duty February 2019**

The Navy's newest fast-attack submarine, USS South Dakota (SSN 790), will be commissioned at Naval Submarine Base New London in Groton, CT. Feb. 2. Designed to operate in both coastal and deep-ocean environments. it'll be the 17th Virginia-class submarine to join the fleet. South Dakota will be the third U.S. Navy ship, but first submarine, to be commissioned bearing the name "South Dakota." The first USS South Dakota (ACR9/CA 9) was a Pennsylvania-class armored cruiser and launched in 1904. Assigned to the Armored Cruiser Squadron, Pacific Fleet, South Dakota cruised off the west coast of the United States through August 1908. She was then sent on a cruise to Samoa and later operated in Central and South American Waters. She returned home in 1912 and was placed in reserve at Puget Sound Navy Yard The second USS South Dakota (BB 57) was commissioned March 1942 and assigned to Task Force 16 centered on the aircraft carrier USS ENTERPRISE (CV 6). South Dakota conducted blockade operations against Japanese forces approaching Guadalcanal, where they engaged Japanese carrier forces in the Battle of Santa Cruz. She saw action in the Battle of Savo Island, Battle of Philippine Sea, Okinawa, Iwo Jima and other Japanese strongholds earning 13 battle stars. South Dakota will have a broad range of capabilities, including anti-submarine warfare; antisurface ship warfare; strike warfare; special operation forces support; intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance; irregular warfare; and mine warfare missions.
