

Rebuilding in Polo

The American Legion post home in Polo is getting an overdue facelift. The building, built in 1956, hadn't seen much for renovations in the last 70 years. There was shag carpet, old wood paneling and a staleness that needed to go. It is now stripped down to the studs, ready for some fresh drywall, new paint and talks of future expansion.

Walking into Post #299, its observed that the building remodel is a metaphor reflective of their membership. Over the last ten years, the demographic of the post has changed dramatically. Today, the vast majority--70 percent, to be exact--of Polo Legionnaires are Persian Gulf or Global War on Terror veterans.

The noticably young group didn't just happen. Brothers Sam and Paul Schaefers, Orient locals and GWOT veterans, started coming to Polo Legion meetings and showing an interest about a decade ago. They encouraged friends to come along, and soon, the room was teeming with younger

the old boys to trust that we weren't just going to take the money and run. But once they handed over the reins, it was game on."

Observing the work party, there were clear-cut clues on how the Polo post was celebrating an All-Time-High of 52 members in 2019. Heath Smith, a recruiter for the South Dakota National Guard, divvied up a few names to directly contact as potential members. Post Adjutant Dwight Aymar assigned renewal lists. But clearly, what continually draws people into the post is the camaraderie present. In tearing down cabinets and insulation, jokes were told, memories relived and plans laid out. The members were not only planning their active recruiting, but working their retention, passive recruitment and community support through activities.

The Polo post still runs the traditional programs of the American Legion. They have a particularly impressive Honor Guard, as many of the current guardsmen sport their military uniforms in lieu of a blazer. The legionnaires have also kept up many of the activities their mentors started, most nota-

Participants should bring their own ammo and shotgun--while the post will have some for sale, they are limited this year.

The crew at Post #299 has expanded their reach into the Polo community as well. The post has an active Facebook page, where drone-shot footage of their Memorial Day programs, pictures of family-oriented Christmas parties and raffles at the local races dominate their timeline. Tapping into local interests, they started an Annual Coyote Hunt, an all-weekend affair that has proven to be a successful fundraiser. The event pulls in a strong showing year after year, and the post expects the same this January. The hunt is scheduled for January 29th-31st, 2021: Sign Up and Rules Meeting on Friday, January 29th at 5pm, Stag Night on Saturday with activities starting at 8pm, and Weigh-Ins on Sunday starting at 12pm. 


Past Dept Commander Weekley Reports to Post Everlasting

Past Department Commander Deane Weekley reported to Post Everlasting on January 6, 2020 in Phoenix, Arizona.

Deane Ernest Weekley was born in Hubbard County, Minnesota on September 24, 1925. He joined the Marine Corps at Camp Pendelton in 1943. He served in the Pacific theater fighting the Japanese. The first island he fought on was Peleliu, going in on the second wave. He said they were getting ready to go on to Okinowa, Japan when they heard the A-Bomb was dropped. He said "God bless our President". He served in Occupied Japan following the bombing, where he was promoted to Corporal.

A 73-year member of Lynn G. Peterson Post #273 of Frederick, SD, Deane served as Department Vice Commander in 1974-1975 and Department Commander in 1978-1979. In recent years, Deane had the opportunity to visit Washington D.C. as part of the Honor Flight program, where he was still quoted as saying, "Once a Marine, always a Marine." 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

Each year about this time the Department Adjutant attends a membership workshop at National Headquarters. As with most meetings right now, it was cancelled due to COVID. However, a virtual membership workshop was held via video-teleconference over several days. One of the topics was recruiting at the Post level. The presenter, who spent a number of years in the military as a recruiter, said there were two main types of recruiting, active and passive.

Active recruiting is when you are involved in the process of trying to convince a person or persons to join the cause. It could be getting a person to join the organization or could be trying to convince someone to help with a project. In either case you are speaking directly to the person. Passive recruiting is when people see what you are doing and are impressed enough to want to help or join.

I mentioned in my last column, posts that do well are the ones that are active in the community. Your post marching in a parade during holidays or holding a Veterans Day event is great way to show your patriotism and is certainly the right thing to do. But does it really show community involvement? What if your Post held a food drive or helped at the local food pantry for those struggling during this COVID pandemic? Does your Post help at a neighborhood clean-up? Have they taken on a special project like painting a WWII veterans' home? The possibilities of helping in your local community are only limited by your imagination.

I have talked to a number of younger veterans. Unfortunately, quite often their perception of The American Legion is a bunch of old guys sitting around a table telling war stories. Although that has its place, most veterans want to do something meaningful or have a purpose. Especially the younger ones because they want to be involved in their community. If you can come up with a project the whole family can be involved in that is even better. A post that is active in the community is demonstrating that passive recruiting. Give the younger veteran a reason to join and they will.

There is another step to the passive recruiting that is quite important. Your post needs to advertise. I don't mean take an ad out in the local paper. I mean the members need to wear their Legion ball caps or post shirts, so people know it is the Legion being active in their community. Take some photos of your members involved in the project and post them on your Facebook page. Send the photos to your local paper and write a short story. There is a good chance they will publish it. Being active in your community is not only good for the community, it is good for your Post.

A key partnership made the South Dakota American Legion Backpack Program expand in 2020.

Operation Homefront, whose mission is to get school supplies into the hands of military, veteran and in-need children, is the charitible arm of Dollar Tree stores. In July 2020, a representative from Operation Homefront contacted Miranda Krumm, the Department Children & Youth Chairman, and arranged for donations from stores across the state.

Krumm then worked to coordinate volunteers to pick up the donated school supplies at Dollar Tree stores. Every week in July, volunteers in Sioux Falls, Mitchell (Hugh Holmes), Watertown (Kevin Hempel) and Aberdeen (Steve Nemmers) picked up boxes of supplies.

Additionally, through their newly implemented grant system, the South Dakota American Legion Foundation provided the Children & Youth Backpack Program a \$1500 dollar grant to purchase backpacks to house the donated materials.

In the beginning of August, all donations and purchased backpacks were centralized to the Chester American Legion & Auxiliary, where volunteers sorted supplies, stuffed backpacks and prepared for distribution.

In total, 335 backpacks and 24 classroom

Firefighter/EMT & Law Enforcement of the Year Award Nominations Due to Districts

We all have them: the local heroes who, day in and day out, work to keep our communities safe. The American Legion recognizes these individuals every year through the Firefighter/EMT, and Law Enforcement Officer of the Year awards. While it goes without saying that the Department wants Posts to recognize its local heroes for what they do, these awards also serve an important secondary purpose: It is firmly believed these awards serve to promote public trust and support of our law enforcement and firefighting agencies, which is more critical now than ever.

Firefighter of the Year:

The Firefighter of the Year Award to a firefighter who has exceeded the requirements expected of his or her position and has shown a distinct pattern of community service and professional achievement. The award, which takes into account heroic acts, will be given annually at the Legion's Department and National Conventions.

Nominees must A: be a citizen of the United States, male or female; and B: be a certified, living, active, full-time, paid, or *volunteer* firefighter. Military firefighters are eligible for participation in this award provided they are state firefighter certified.

Nomination packages cover the time period of 1 July to 30 June. District Commanders are responsible for ensuring their nominees are forwarded to the Department by December 31st. It is recommended that Posts complete and forward their nominations in November. The application for Department Firefighter/EMT of the Year is the same as National.

Each year, The American Legion gives its National Law Enforcement Officer of the Year Award to a well-rounded law enforcement officer who has exceeded the duty requirements expected of his or her position and has demonstrated a distinct pattern of community service coupled with professional achievement. The award, which especially takes into account heroic acts, is presented annually at the Legion's Department and National Convention.

Nominees must be U.S. citizens and living, active, full-time and paid, sworn law enforcement officers entrusted with full authority and the powers of arrest. Posthumous awards will be acceptable only if the nominee's death has occurred after the department's selection.

Nominees must be assigned to or fully recognized by municipal, county, district or state police; highway patrol; sheriff's office or as a sworn federal law enforcement officer (FBI, Secret Service agent, U.S. Marshal, National Park Police, U.S. Capitol Police, etc.) Military police officers or investigators are eligible if they are state law enforcement certified. Nominees must also reside and be assigned or attached for duty in the nominating department.

Nomination packages cover the time period of 1 July to 30 June. District Commanders are responsible for ensuring their nominees are forwarded to the Department by December 31st. It is recommended that Posts complete and forward their nominations in November. The application for Department Law Enforcement Officer of the Year is the same as National.

Tee It Up For Troops Holds Golf Tourney Benefitting SD Veteran Non-Profits

On Monday, July 20, 2020, Tee It Up for the Troops-Black Hills held its second annual golf event at Arrowhead Country Club in Rapid City, SD. This year's event saw tremendous growth in which the number of participants was up 40% and fundraising nearly doubled. The local non-profits that the Black Hills chapter benefited were Rapid City's very own Super Dogs for Super Heroes, who trains rescue dogs to become service dogs for veterans and Warner's DTOM 22/0 Foundation who provides South Dakota veterans with the opportunity to participate in the Draper Method Equine Therapy. In addition to a great day of fundraising for our veteran community, Tee It Up for the Troops-Black Hills is an opportunity for fellow veterans of all conflicts to get out on the golf course and socialize with each other and our civilian community. For the second straight year, the Black Hills event had 40 veterans who played in the event and another 8 veterans that volunteered. Troy Teal, an Air Force Combat Veteran who is also a five-time World Long

Drive Championship Competitor, was also on the course providing entertainment and support. In only its second year of existence, the Black Hills event has quickly become one of the largest Tee It Up for the Troops events in terms of veteran participation in the nation. Tee It Up for the Troops-Black Hills is creating quite the stir in South Dakota. This year, Governor Kristi Noem declared Monday, July 20, 2020 as "Tee It Up for the Troops Day" in the state of South Dakota and U.S. Senator Mike Rounds, who has supported the event each year had his West River office play in the event. In the media, the event was covered by NBC's NewsCenter1 Media Group and ABC's Good Morning KOTA Territory. The top two sponsors were NewsCenter1 Media Group and Midco along with many other local business sponsors, like the American Legion Post 22, that make this event successful.

Even though the event is only heading into its third year, it has established strong ties with the American Legion. Tournament Director, Joey Franze and Committee Member, Beau Garcia are members of American Legion Post 22 in Rapid City, SD. In addition to taking on leadership roles within Tee It Up for the Troops, members of Post 22 have participated in the first two events. Warner Legionnaire, Chris Reder was also on the course raising awareness for his foundation DTOM 22/0. Tee It Up for the Troops-Black Hills looks forward to

strengthening their ties with the American Legion as Post 22 will become the 2021 local beneficiary. Developing this partnership between Tee It Up for the Troops-Black Hills and American Legion Post 22 will help the event to continue to move forward and create an event that can only be found in the Black Hills of South Dakota...and they are only getting started.

The COVID-19 Pandemic has had significant impact on the world of VA Compensation and Pension claims. Offices have been closed, remote or short-staffed, Compensation exams have been missed, and its been difficult to collect and submit evidence relevant to claims. Because of all of this, the VA has allowed for extensions provided the case meets the effective dates.

Effective March 1, 2020, if a claimant or a claimant's authorized representative requests an extension of a time limit associated with a required action based on the COVID-19 pandemic, including,

- the filing of a claim that would perfect a previous expired communication of intent
- the filing of a response to a proposed adverse action
- the submission of requested evidence, or
- attendance at a hearing or C&P examina-

VBA will grant these requests under the good cause provisions, provided the time limit would have expired or situation occurred on or after March 1, 2020.

To request an extension for filing due to COVID-19, claimants should note the request on their filing submission or attach the request as a separate document. Where an extension is requested after expiration of a time limit, the action required of the claimant must be taken concurrent with or prior to the filing of a request for extension of the time limit.

To ensure full consideration of a time limit extension, claimants should note in their request that they are requesting an extension of the time allowed to take the specified action on a claim because of COVID-19.

Greetings to my fellow Legionnaires!

I hope this finds you all healthy, happy, and ready to get back to work for the youth of our state. What follows is a message on planning your year assuming the "best case" scenario. Hopefully there will soon be vaccine for the COVID-19 virus and our lives might get back to normal. That means, I need the Americanism Officers/Commanders/Adjutants/any member willing to help, to make their best effort at getting back in the schools.

You should soon have your Americanism packets from Department with lots of useful information and tools. The packet has been delayed while we waited for Boys State officers to meet and set the 2021 dates. The meeting took place on August 22nd in Pierre SD. The 2021 session will take place from May 31st to June 4th. This keeps the program at five (5) days vice the proposed six (6). Both Juniors and Seniors will be eligible to attend in 2021. This means those boys who were unable to attend in 2020 can attend in 2021, but they won't be eligible for Boys Nation.

You will find attractive marketing materials (rack cards) you can share with your school counselors and principals. Try to meet with these individuals and show them what we have to offer. If you sell them on the programs, they will help you recruit. All Posts will receive some marketing materials, while the larger Posts with one or more schools, will receive more of each. The "Big 3" sheet has been updated online (https://www.sdlegion.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/09/Americanism-Big-3-2021-ADJ-COLORS.pdf) and can be printed for distribution to those groups you are briefing. It may be especially hard to get in the schools during the Fall semester, but at least try to make contact via phone conversation and email. Deliver the rack cards and offer to discuss the printed information. Most will be extremely impressed with the amount of scholarships we are offering this year (especially for the Oratorical competition).

Our first hurdle will be finding participants for the Oratorical Contest. Here again the biggest draw should be the scholarship money being offered. The State contest will be held during Midwinter on Sunday the 21st of February at 10:30 A.M. Find out who your debate coaches/speech teachers are and give them a call. The scholarship amounts increased several thousand dollars over 2020's numbers. If you would like to volunteer to help with the State contest, please send me an email at doughinut@gmail.com.

I've tried over the last several months to provide as much helpful information on "how to" get the word out about our programs. If you need ideas or a complete roadmap, go to the August 2020 edition of the SD Legion News, page 9 (https://www.sdlegion.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/07/South-Dakota-Legion-News-August-2020-Web.pdf) and look for my "Promoting the Big 3" article. It should help you decide whom to target beyond just the schools. There are also Points of Contact for the other Americanism Programs (Baseball/Scouting/Shooting Sports/etc.) if you need help or advice on any of those. Other new information to help Post Americanism Officers complete their annual Americanism Reports is here: https://www.sdlegion.org/post-adjutant-manual-forms/. You will find a "how to" complete the form worksheet, as well as an example of a winning report. I sincerely hope these additions help make the process easier. You know you are doing the work, so take credit for it.
