American Legion National Commander, Paul Dillard, visited South Dakota the last week in April. His visit started in Sioux Falls where he met Legionnaires in Garretson, Sioux Falls and Montrose. He next traveled to Madison, Brookings and Arlington where he helped dedicate the Arlington new Post home. Then on to Huron, Pierre and the Rapid City area where he also spent time in Piedmont, Sturgis and Box Elder. While visiting the Posts, he discussed his No Veteran Left Behind program as well as legislative issues and Veteran and Children's Fund. During his trip across the state, he toured the new South Dakota Veterans Cemetery, met with leadership at the Sioux Falls VA, toured the Military Heritage Alliance building where he helped unveil a POW/MIA display for the main entry area. In Pierre, he visited with the South Dakota Secretary of Veterans Affairs, Greg Whitlock, toured the South Dakota Law Enforcement Training center and discussed the state's Youth Trooper Program as well as met with members of the South Dakota Boys State Board of Directors to discuss the Department's program. While in the Black Hills area, he visited Mount Rushmore and Crazy Horse monuments as well as a quick stop at Legion Lake. As he was departing at the Rapid City Airport, Commander Dillard stated he had a great visit and enjoyed his time with the South Dakota American Legion.







ANNUAL COMMITTEE REPORTS

These annual committee reports are submitted and printed in the South Dakota Legion News in accordance with Article IV, Section 4 of The American Legion Department of South Dakota Constitution.

Annual Report of the Legislative Committee

Commander,

Here is the annual report of the South Dakota American Legion Legislative Committee. The members of the committee are Chairman Doug Feltman, Chris "Van" Van DeList, Kevin Morello, PDC Rod Martens and PDC Gary Watts. The lobbyists for this year were Doug Feltman, Adjutant Kevin Hemple, PDC Terry Hansen and Chris "Van" Van DeList.

On Feb. 13, a Zoom meeting was held with all committee members attending. Bills that had been submitted were reviewed and the committee was given instructions to review the bills so that an informed decision could be made on each bill at the 22 February meeting in Pierre.

The Council discussed the bills that were likely to be of a concern to Veterans and set the Council's priorities. That evening the Veterans Council hosted a Legislative reception with all Legislators invited and it was well attended by the Veterans Council and Legislators.

On 22 February 2022 the Legislative Committee met in Pierre at Post # 8. Roll called showed the following committee members present: Department Commander Gary Wolkow, Chairman Doug Feltman, Chris "Van" Van DeList and Kevin Morello. Americanism Officer Harry Boner was present as a guest. The Legislative Committee then reviewed and discussed 13 bills, and a decision was made on how we were going to proceed on each bill.

There were 4 House bills that were discussed and we were going to monitor 3, support and lobby for 1.

There were also 9 Senate bills that were discussed and we were going to monitor 8, support and lobby for 1.

The evening reception was hosted by Post # 8. All Legislators received a written invitation and it was well attended. This reception gave the Legislative Committee, the Legion Lobbyist, and Legionnaires an opportunity to meet the Legislators, get to know them and give them our recommendations and thoughts on particular bills that had an impact on Veterans. At the reception while talking to the Legislators, it is very obvious that The South Dakota American Legion has a good and respected relationship with the Legislators in the State.

Post # 8 again did an excellent job in hosting the reception and served a delicious supper to all in attendance. Thank you Post #8.

Here are the results of the bills on the Legislative Committee's list:

m HB~1001}$ - An act to revise the freeze on assessments for dwellings of disabled and senior citizens - Signed by the Governor

 $\rm HB~1011$ -An act to revise the application process for the reduction of tax on dwellings owned by paraplegics - Signed by the Governor

HB 1013 - An act to make an appropriation for certain costs related to Capitol Lake and to declare an emergency - Signed by the Governor

 $\mbox{HB 1067}$ - An act to require the waiver of animal adoption fees for veterans - Deferred to 41st day

HB 1083 - Provide a partial property tax exemption for the surviving spouses of certain veterans Signed by the Governor

SB 19 - An act to provide that health care facilities and accredited prevention and treatment facilities may establish reasonable restrictions related to the medical use of cannabis - Signed by the Governor

SB 41 - An act to revise the appropriation for the construction of a National Guard Readiness Center in Sioux Falls, for the purchase and exchange of property between the state and the Sioux Falls Development Foundation, and to declare an emergency - Signed by the Governor

SB 48 - An act to make an appropriation for the redesign and renovation of the Wagner Readiness Center and to declare an emergency - Signed by the Governor

SB 49 - An act to authorize the Department of the Military to construct a cold storage building located in Rapid City, South Dakota to make an appropriation therefor and to declare an emergency - Signed by the Governor

SB 50 - An act to make an appropriation for water, wastewater and storm water projects throughout state government and to declare an emergency - Signed by the Governor

SB 63 - An act to revise the appropriation for road improvements to the State Veterans Cemetery, to provide for ordinary operation of the cemetery, and to declare an emergency - Signed by the Governor

SB 68 - An act to revise holiday pay for state employees - Signed by the Governor

SB 75 - An act to establish certain pay provisions for state employees working shifts longer than eight hours a day - Deferred to 41st day

SB 197 - came to the committee's attention late in the session but was very important to The American Legion:

To require the POW/MIA flag be displayed in the Senate and House of Representative Chambers - Signed by the Governor $\,$

We received one donation of \$100.00 in 2021.

Applications and brochures are online at www.SDlegion.org. We are currently revising the application for 2022/23 scholarship year.

The 2022 Educator of the Year packets were due May 1, 2022. Because the deadline for this article was May 3, 2022, the committee did not have time to review the packets. The winner will be announced at the state convention.

The education scholarships offered by the Department of South Dakota are for post-secondary education, college, or technical schools, for children of veterans, grandchildren of veterans, and veterans, who meet the requirements as set forth in the Education Scholarship brochure. Please read the brochure for all the current changes. In all cases, the veteran listed on the application must be a member of the South Dakota The American Legion. The student must attend a higher education school in the state of

South Dakota unless their plan of study not taught in a South Dakota school. The fund is self-sustaining through donations.

Annually, the brochure and application processes are reviewed. No monies were added to the fund from the Department's outside income programs. More specific details can be obtained from State Headquarters, your District Education Loan Chairperson, or a member of the state Education Scholarship Committee. The state committee consists of Jerry Mencke, Huron, Paul Weidenbach, Lesterville, James Moore, Burke, Perry Schmidt, Redfield, Shawnee Redbear, Pine Ridge, Michael Pauling, Piedmont, Philip Egeberg, Brookings, Ed Hruska Jr., Sioux Falls, and Hugh Holmes, Mitchell.

The Education Scholarship Committee expresses our appreciation for the various memorials and donations received this past year, totaling \$1000.00. Annual Report of the Americanism Committee

Commander Wolkow, What a busy year for the South Dakota American Legion Americanism program. Thank you for selecting me as the Americanism Chairman for the Department of South Dakota. Your leadership and willingness to direct my efforts for the year were greatly appreciated. Americanism is alive and

well in South Dakota.

Stepping into this position of State Americanism Commission Chairman, I had large shoes to fill. Anyone that knows me and my size 16 5E feet would not think that filling the shoes of our most recent Americanism Commission Chairmen, Doug Harris, and Larry Madison, would be a problem. With their help, I was quickly able to get a grasp of a program that many Posts in SD are participating in. Working with the Boys State, Youth Trooper, Educational Committee Chairmen, plus working with the Youth Program Administrator at State HQ, we made enhancements to the "Big 3" handout and wall posters by adding a QRC code (the square box with dots in it) to the front cover of each document. By seeing this code, our youth could take their cell phones out and snap a quick photo of the QRC code. When the student had time, they could open the photo and that code would automatically direct them to the web site to find out more information about these programs or even directly navigate the student straight to the registration process.

In addition to the enhancements to the "Big 3" literature, I built on the groundwork that both Doug and Larry had started regarding the 4-H program in South Dakota. Youth today are so busy with sports, Church youth groups, 4-H and FFA. These are all fine activities to be a part of. When thinking about these activities, 4-H was the best organization to match up with many of our Legion Youth activities. A letter was created for the State 4-H leadership, informing them about the Americanism programs of the American Legion and how Post members from across the state could assist their local 4-H leaders by helping with oratorical activities/public speaking and shooting sports. Students that participate in 4-H develop leadership qualities that will aid them well when participating in Boys and Girls State. - Flag Education Program


- School and Student programs

Annual Report of the Internal Affairs Committee

Fellow Legionnaires,

I would like to thank Commander Wolkow for appointing me to serve as the Chairman for the Internal Affairs Commission for 2022.

The Internal Affairs Commission met on 9 May 2022. Present at this meeting were State Commander Gary Wolkow, State Adjutant Kevin Hempel, Chairman PDC Mark Weinmann, PDC Byron Callies, PDC Terry Hanson, and PDC Tim Jurgens.

The Constitution of the American Legion, Department of South Dakota, provides in Article XV, Section 1, that "Any amendment to this constitution may be proposed by any Post, or by the Department Internal Affairs Commission. Any amendment proposed by a Post shall be submitted in writing to Department Headquarters at least six weeks prior to the annual Department Convention. The Department Adjutant shall present it immediately to the Department Internal Affairs Commission. At least 30 days prior to said convention, the Department Internal Affairs Commission shall transmit to all Posts, through Department Headquarters, a full copy of all amendments submitted by Posts, together with the favorable or unfavorable recommendation of the Internal Affairs Commission thereon, with a brief statement of reasons for such recommendation, and at the same time the Department Internal Affairs Commission shall in like manner, distribute to all Posts, full copy of any proposed amendment originating with the Department Internal Affairs Commission itself.

No amendment shall be in order for consideration at any convention unless it shall have been so submitted or unless one day notice of proposed of a proposed amendment is given and there is then unanimous consent of all delegates to such consideration. If such unanimous is given, the Commander shall immediately and without debate, refer the resolution to the Department Internal Affairs Commission for consideration and recommendation to the proposing. Convention for final action.

The only way the American Legion is able to change and grow is with resolutions submitted by local posts within the Department.

This year, 9 resolutions have been submitted to State Headquarters from local posts, and 2 resolution have been written by the Department Internal Affairs Commission, Of these 11 resolutions, 5 resolutions are being referred to the Resolutions Committee at the State Convention,

- 2 Resolutions received DO NOT PASS RECOMMEDATIONS.
- Resolution 22-3 to change the election cycles for District Commanders,
- Resolution 22-9, to change the term limits on members of the Department Finance Commission.
- 4 resolutions received DO PASS RECOMMENDATIONS.
- Resolution 22-2 would change the elected term of County Commanders to 2 years to coincide with the term of the District Commander.
- Resolution 22-6 would allow posts in good standing with less than 15 members to have 1 delegate and 1 alternate to a vote at the State Convention.
- Resolution 22-10 would change the selection process and term limits on the Department Finance Commission.
- Resolution 22-11 would create separate committees for Membership committee and Marketing, Media and Communications committee.

The year 2020 took a heavy toll on all forms of public gatherings. The American Legion Riders of South Dakota was no exception. However, 2021 was a year of recovery. Motorcycles were back on the road attending rallies, leading funeral processions and raising funds for Veterans and their families stat wide.

One of the earliest events in 2021 was the May "River Wreath Run" with over 20 Riders and family members gathered at Post 8 in Pierre SD. Riders faced snow, sleet, hail and tornadoes on this 2 day event to place a Me-

morial Wreath on the steps of the Soldiers and Sailors Memorial in Pierre. The group gathered Saturday night for a meet and greet at Post 8. A burger fry with all the fixings was also served there. Another state-wide event was the Commander's 605 Ride in June. Outgoing Commander Fred Nelson (also an American Legion Rider) led a group of 16 Legion Riders out of Post 164, Spearfish SD, on a statewide circuit of the perimeter of SD. The event took 4 days and covered over 1400 miles. Interstate travel was avoided at all costs. 20 Posts were visited along the way. Each Post provided refreshments and donations to the South Dakota American Legion Foundation. Riders dropped off and/or joined the ride each day. All together over \$4800.00 was raised from the posts visited and another \$1300.00 from the Annual Convention in Huron for a grand total of \$6100.00.

Your Foundation was established as a 501(C)(3) non-profit corporation in 2010 for the purpose of accumulating an endowed body of funds that would be professionally invested, with the earning from it to come back to the SD AL to help fund the Legion Programs. Your forward-thinking leadership realized back then, that an income flow from the Foundation would be important to help fund the programs of the SD American Legion. That has proven to be more and more important as time goes by, and will continue to be essential in the future.

The seed money to start the Foundation (approx. \$40,000) came from the SD Honor Flight, when it was

dissolved. Since then, the balance has grown from the contributions of individuals, Posts, businesses and events. The annual Fun Auction held at the Department Convention has been an important source of funding. Thank you for participating! Donations of property and collectables as well as cash have been donated. The Foundation being named in individual wills or as the beneficiary of life insurance are terrific ways of helping in the future

The principal balance of your Foundation will only grow over time. Of the earnings on the invested funds, approximately 4% of the balance is paid back to the SD American Legion. The rest of the earnings go into growth. At the present balance, approximately \$10,000 per year is paid back to the SD American Legion to assist with the many programs within the four pillars of the organization, with emphasis on helping children and veterans.

It has been reported nationally, that giving from businesses and corporations has slowed since the Covid pandemic, but that donations from individuals have been strong. The experiences of your Foundation have been similar, this past year. Individuals have remained strong donors, and Legionnaires are the strongest of the group. Thank you very much!

In the past year, contributions have been just over \$18,000. The Total Net Assets of the Foundation are presently just over \$276,000. The downtrend of the stock market in recent months effects the Foundation's balances. This past year, the Foundation has granted funds to support the Midwest Honor Flight and the Youth Trooper Academy program.

Thank you for your contributions to the SD American Legion Foundation in the past, and please continue with your support! We are all proud of the work that the SD American Legion does through its many programs. You can be proud of the effects that your contributions to the Foundation are making now, and will continue to make for decades and decades to come. Thank you!


The Department VA&R Commission meets twice per year. We make every effort to meet face-to-face and our other meeting is by Zoom or teleconference.

Annual Report of the Membership Committee

The 2021-2022 year in the South Dakota American Legion was started off from a great year where South Dakota was the #1 Department in membership for the 2021 year. Your Membership and Marketing (M&M) committee's service projects had support from a good number of Posts. Our two service projects for this year were the DTOM 22 Veteran Ranch "sweat equity" day and the Midwest Honor Flight fundraiser. Both events

were more successful than we had initially anticipated. Service projects coordinated at the State level are a great way to help organizations who are helping the South Dakota veterans on a daily basis and to increase media coverage of what our Four pillars are.

The DTOM 22 Veteran ranch project on July 10, 2021, had volunteers from across the state coming together to help a South Dakota non-profit. The volunteers from 6 organizations donated over 600 hours of service to include installing 1,000 feet of fence, tore down an old barn, and a significant amount of general cleanup on the ranch. Local news was there to cover the event and was showcased on the front page of 5 large city publications.

The Midwest Honor flight fundraiser campaign of "Send One" was a huge success. The initial goal was to raise \$50,000 so we could name the flight the "South Dakota American Legion Midwest Honor Flight". The South Dakota American Legion Foundation donated the initial funds of \$10,000 to encourage donations from the Posts. Post 88 of White, SD came to 2021 State convention with over \$6,000 as well to solidify a solid start to this Fundraiser. As of May 1, 2022, over \$180,000 has been raised, this enough money to cover two flights of veterans. This gives our leadership this next year to utilize the media to broadcast the South Dakota American Legion story of community service. This campaign is a huge success for the South Dakota American Legion Family.

The M&M committee this past year created a recruiting brochure specific to the South Dakota American Legion using the consolidated post reports from the past 5 years to show impact. They also created 3 sets of recruiting displays. The displays were paired with folding tables, tablecloths, a wheeled case full of brochures and a SDAL themed runner. The 3 sets of recruiting materials were given to the 2 Dept. Vice Commanders and the membership chairman to be available for loaning out to Posts for larger recruiting events. This provides a professional looking recruiting table that can help Posts have a standard display to recruit from.

Membership totals for this year were slower than the previous year. As of May 1, 2022, we are at 92.03% of our membership goal. With a historic year of inflation from varying circumstances, many have reported that they were impacted from the inflation.

Thank you for this opportunity to continue serving in the South Dakota American Legion.

Boy Scouts were the first youth group that the American Legion supported. Our support for the Boy Scouts of America began at the American Legion's first national convention in 1919. Nationally the American Legion sponsors 2,500 plus units.

South Dakota has 103 Scouting units. Eighteen of these Troops and Packs are sponsored by a South Dakota American Legion Post, which

leaves 85 Troops or Packs that could use a sponsor or co-sponsor.

Within South Dakota, probably the longest continued American Legion Post sponsorship of a Troop goes to Spearfish Post 164. They have sponsored Boy Scout Troop 17 for 93 years.

Contact your local Troop or Pack and have your Post check into sponsoring possibilities. Explore opportunities to help make a positive impact. Perhaps Post members could serve as merit badge counselors? Help provide transportation to an outing. If it weren't for an American Legion member that stepped forward, I likely would not have received Eagle Scout.

Each year, the Department of South Dakota awards one Eagle Scout of the Year, and this year's Eagle Scout of the Year is Riley A. Murphy from Summerset, SD. The Troop's sponsor is American Legion Post 320 in Rapid City, SD.

The American Legion annually honors the Eagle Scout of the Year at the national convention. The winner receives a \$10,000 scholarship, and the three runners-up are each awarded \$2,500 scholarships.

Our committee's goals for the upcoming year are to increase the number of scouting units sponsored by the American Legion Family and increase the number of Eagle Scout of the Year application packages.


